INTRO/NARRATOR (same voice):

Hallo and welcome back to 'Learning by Ear'. You are about to hear the third episode in our continuing story about "The Unwelcome Evening Guests - a family's fight against malaria." In the last programme, Masikas family welcomed home a new child – ZAWADI, and thanks to the headteacher, Karembo got to learn more about preventing malaria by using a mosquito net that had been treated with an insecticide. How long will they use it and what will happen if they don't sleep under the net? So let's see what happens in today's episode entitled "Symptoms and Remedies".

MUSIC INTERLUDE

SCENE ONE: MORNING AT MASIKA'S HOME

A-SFX: COCK CROWS, BIRDS SINGING

1. BETTINA: (CALLS OUT)

Karembo! It's 5.30 in the morning. I need some water to bathe Zawadi. You'll have to prepare breakfast for your father and you also need to get ready for school.

2. KAREMBO: (WAKING UP)

Mmmh, Oooh, mum I don't feel very well today.

3. BETTINA: Yes, I know. Nobody likes to wake up this early,

but I need your help.

4. KAREMBO: Nooo, it's not that I don't want to help. I have such

aawww (CRIES IN PAIN)...

all my body aches, my joints, my head... my...

5. BETTINA: You are not fooling me Karembo. Remember, I

was once your age too. Now, get up and fetch the

water! You know, I also need to get ready and

take Zawadi to the clinic for his first inoculation

injection.

6. KAREMBO: (unhappy)

I am telling you the truth. Here, feel my

temperature. Please believe me Mum.

7. **BETTINA**: Okay, I believe you... (SHOUTS)

Now, go!

8. B-SFX: ZAWADI/BABY STARTS TO CRY

9. BETTINA: Now look what you've done! You woke up

Zawadi..sssh husssssh, my baby.

10. KAREMBO: I'm sorry. I'll go. Hey, mum how did you like

sleeping under the net?

11. BETTINA: I have never slept so peacefully. It was a really

good idea. Now, go before your father wakes up

and finds nothing has been done.

12. NARRATOR: There's a wise saying that goes, 'prevention is

better than cure', and recognizing early symptoms

of malaria can help stop the disease from

becoming a killer. But, unfortunately for lots of people these symptoms are ignored. Bettina, Karembo's mother doesn't believe her daughter. She doesn't take her seriously. She insists Karembo gets up and does all that is asked of her. Later, at school, things get worse, but first let's drop in on their neighbour, Mama David.

SCENE TWO: MORNING AT MAMA DAVID'S HOUSE

13. C-SFX: TEA BEING POURED IN CUP

14. MAMA DAVID: (CALLS OUT)

David! Tea is ready. Hurry up, or it will get cold.

15. DAVID: (**GRUMBLING**) Mama, I've told you before, I'm

not a kid anymore. I can pour my own tea.

16. MAMA DAVID: I know you can. But if you are such a grown-up

man like you say you are, why is your room

looking like a pigsty?

17. DAVID: I will clean it later, is there anything else?

18. MAMA DAVID: Yes, David, this smoke from the mosquito coils

isn't good for your chest. You have to stop burning

them. I don't like the smell or the smoke or the

ash that is left over after.

19. DAVID: Then you must be a mosquito too. **(LAUGHS)**

20. MAMA DAVID: What did you just call me?! (**SHOCKED**)

Did I hear you right? Did you call me a mosquito?

Huh?

21. DAVID: No... No, Mum I just said that you should buy me

a mosquito net then.

22. MAMA DAVID: Oh, how I curse the day I gave birth to you. I wish

you would just be like Karembo. Why can't you be

like her? Or just try and act like her?

23. DAVID: Well, actually, I like her. Er, sorry, I mean I'm like

her.

24. MAMA DAVID: I just wish your father would still be alive today to

hear you talk such rubbish to me. I know he

would...he would...(STARTS TO CRY)

25. DAVID: I'm sorry, Mum, I'll be good, I... I'll clean up and if

you want. I'll stop burning the coils, but I'm

scared. I don't want to get malaria

and...(PAUSES) die like Daddy.

26. MAMA DAVID: He didn't die of Malaria! He..he...(**CRIES MORE**)

27. DAVID: Mum, I know you don't believe in modern

medicines, but you must accept that Dad died

because he didn't get treated soon enough. I don't

know. Maybe he would have survived if he had

gone to hospital sooner. And, just so that you know, the mosquito coils are safe for humans because they are made from pyrethrum which is...

28. MAMA DAVID: (CHANGES TOPIC)

Finish your tea and go to school.

29. NARRATOR: The fight against malaria is being hindered by a

lot of different factors. There are so many myths

and misconceptions about the disease. Mama

David firmly believed that malaria was nothing but

an "evil spirit" that had to be cast out by a

witchdoctor. As the day progressed, so did

Karembo's fever. Meanwhile Masika, Karembo's

Father, finding no one at home, remembered the

insecticide-treated mosquito net and suddenly,

had an idea....But first, let's join Karembo in the

Headteacher's office.

SCENE THREE: HEADTEACHER'S OFFICE

30. KAREMBO: (SHIVERING IN BETWEEN LINES)

Madam, I'm here to ask for permission to go

home. I'm sick.

31. HEADTEACHER: That's obvious. You are shaking like a leaf in the.

Sit down. I'll write you a sick note but it MUST be

signed by a doctor.

32. KAREMBO: Yes... Madam, can I ask you a question?

33. HEADTEACHER: Karembo... Karembo always asking questions,

Okay, what's your question?

34. KAREMBO: Madam Headteacher, do you think I have

malaria?

35. HEADTEACHER: Now that's a question only a doctor can answer, I

can't. You know, the symptoms of malaria are

similar to many other illnesses and it's not easy to

tell them apart. So, the best thing is for you to be

tested and then we will know. But don't worry,

malaria can be treated. Just make sure you see a

doctor, okay?

36. KAREMBO: Okay, Madam. Thank you.

37. D-SFX: DOOR CLOSES

NARRATOR: Karembo went home and missed a half day of school. It is estimated that in places where malaria occurs frequently, children lose as much as 60% of their school time. Karembo had to walk home very slowly because she was feeling sick and dizzy. She arrived there feeling weak and tired. And then she was greeted with a surprise.

SCENE FOUR: AT MASIKA'S HOME...KAREMBO ALONE AT HOME

38. MUSIC INTERLUDE

39. KAREMBO: (FAINT WEAK VOICE)

Mum... Hello... anybody home? Hmm, seems like

no-ones here. . Ooh, my head. It feels like somebody is pounding with a hammer inside. , let me rest under the new mosquito net since mum and Zawadi are not here yet...

- 40. E-SFX: DOOR OPENS.
- 41. KAREMBO: Huh?! (SURPRISED AT NOT SEEING THE NET)

Am I hallucinating or what? Where's the net? I

thought Mum said she slept so well and...

(COMES TO REALIZATION)...oh no! Dad...

Daddy must have taken it.

- 42. F-SFX: DOOR OPENS, MASIKA HEARD WHISTLING
- 43. MASIKA: ENTERS HAPPY, WHISTLING...
- **44. KAREMBO**: Hello Dad.
- 45. MASIKA: (CAUGHT BY SURPRISE)

Karembo what are you doing here? Aren't you

supposed to be at school?

46. KAREMBO: Yes I am... but I'm not feeling well. I told Mum this

morning but she didn't believe me, and when I

went to school it got worse I had to ask for

permission to come home. Dad, where is the

mosquito net? It's not hanging over the bed

anymore?

47. MASIKA: (IGNORES QUESTION)

What is wrong with you? How do you feel?

48. KAREMBO: I feel terrible... muscle pains, very bad headache,

and I even started shivering from cold in class. I

couldn't concentrate. Dad, where is the net?

49. MASIKA: Oh, it seems you are developing a fever. Don't

worry. You lie down I'll go and get you some

chloroquine and some painkillers and tomorrow

you'll feel fine.

50. KAREMBO: The net Dad, where is it?

51. MASIKA: Oh, the net. Aah, that net is just what I needed.

Imagine I only cast it in the water once and I

caught so much fish. I won't have to go to the lake

for the next two days. Isn't that something?

52. KAREMBO: But Daddy, that net was supposed to protect

Zawadi from the mosquitos, and you took it and

used it as a fishing net?

53. MASIKA: I had no choice! (ANNOYED) What was I

supposed to do? Protect Zawadi from mosquitoes

and watch him die of starvation? Now lie down

and stop lecturing me on how I should take care

of you all. I'll be back with the medicine soon.

NARRATOR: Was Masika right to use the net for fishing in order to feed

his family? One thing is for sure. He has now exposed his son to the bites of the deadly anopheles mosquitoes - the 'unwelcome evening guests' as Karembo likes to call them. As evening fell Bettina came home and didn't even notice that the net was missing because Karembo was now sick in bed. Not knowing what to do, Bettina turned to Mama David for advice.

AT MAMA DAVIDS HOUSE

54. MAMA DAVID: Calm down... calm down Bettina... tell me how is

Karembo feeling, exactly?

55. BETTINA: (PANICKY VOICE)

I just don't remember seeing her like this, not since she was really young! She's trembling under the blanket and her temperature seems very high. She doesn't want to eat... Mama David what

should I do?

56. MAMA DAVID: Relax... She will be fine, make sure you put a

soaked cloth on her forehead and cover her with

more blankets; the more the better so she can

sweat the fever out. When she wakes up

tomorrow, she will be feeling as healthy as a new

born baby.

57. BETTINA: What about medicine? My husband gave her

some chloroquine already. Should we give her

something else for fever?

58. MAMA DAVID: No!... don't give her anything else. Just make sure

she eats something. Her body needs the food to fight the illness.

59. BETTINA: Thank you! Thank you very much for your advice,

I really didn't know what to do... Good night Mama

David.

60. MAMA DAVID: No problem. Good night and say hello to Masika

and tell him I need some fish.

61. G-SFX: DOOR OPENS, CLOSES

OUTRO/NARRATOR:

With this, Bettina hurried back home and started to treat Karembo . Will it work and make Karembo well again? And what will sleeping without a net mean for young Zawadi? And how will this sickness affect Karembo's education?
