INTRO

Welcome to Learning By Ear and episode six of our new drama series

about deforestation.

Set within the dramatic backdrop of civil war, this story reveals how

deforestation- the loss of trees and grasslands- has destroyed rural life

and created conflict between two farming communities. Now, thrown

together as refugees in Dovani Camp these people are beginning to find

common solutions for the future.

In today's episode, Isingoma and Akiki are very disappointed that their

siblings Kato and Sesi were not among the new arrivals at Dovani

Camp. Akiki has a dream – she thinks it is a sign, but can it really tell her

where her sister is? Join us now, as Chika praises the women for getting

more involved in new farming techniques.

Episode SIX: "Living in Harmony."

1.MUSIC UP

Scene 1

2.CHIKA NARRATOR:

have been working here as part of *Help Africa*. It is an organization that set up this camp in order to house refugees fleeing from the war that broke out six months ago. The men have been repairing fences; the youth group has been drawing posters warning about contaminated water; the woman's group has been involved in agroforestry – that's a way of preserving trees and growing food side by side. This morning we supervised the planting of soybeans with a group of women who fully support the work we are doing!

Scene 2

3.SFX morning ambience outside / women's voices

4.MOTHER: Soya is so good. It also produces good cooking

oil.

5.TALIB: Yes, and it's very rich in iron.

6.CHIKA: We're doing well. This method of alley cropping

means we plant between the lines of trees.

7.MOTHER: And soybean grows really well in these

temperatures. We should have a big enough

surplus to sell and make a living from what we

grow.

8.CHIKA: That's the aim. Remember, MaKipko, we want to

rotate the crops so that in seasons when there

isn't enough sunlight for soybeans, we will plant

wheat in the alleys instead.

9.MOTHER: But we still have the problem of wood fuel for

cooking.

10.TALIB: We have reserved a section of the forest for fire

wood. But we will need to keep replacing the

trees we use.

11.CHIKA: That's why we are building up a nursery of

seedlings, so we can plant new trees. But we

must also find ways of using less wood.

12.MOTHER: We will be discussing that this afternoon.

13.CHIKA: That's right, and I can report back to everyone,

how beautiful these alleys will look, with maize

and soya and herbs in between the trees.

14.MOTHER: Ai Chika. They will never want to return to their

homes, if you do that. Anyway, I fear the military

will have turned the forests and fields to a

wasteland with their fires.

15.MUSIC UP

Scene 3

16.SFX Daytime ambience outside. Cows/ birds.

17.SFX: SOUND OF DRAWING WITH CRAYONS ON PAPER

18.AKIKI: I love drawing! Look! ...this shows my Kiroko and

there's a big black cross over her head because she is drinking from water that is only meant for

us.

19.ISI: That's good. Mine shows a girl drinking from a

pond that is meant only for cows. I made her look

just like you Akiki!

20.AKIKI: Oh that's very good Isi. I wish I could draw like

that. Can I keep it? Please!

21.ISI: No. These posters must be finished and put up

quickly. Too many children are getting sick from

drinking contaminated water. But I will make a

special picture, just for you. I promise.

22.AKIKI: Oh thank you.

23.ISI: Did you know you were talking in your sleep last

night?

24.AKIKI: Oh! What was I saying?

25.ISI: Something about a Lenge tree and hiding inside.

26.AKIKI: Oh ...how funny...Ma has been telling me the

story about an old man who hid in the Lenge

tree.

27.ISI: What kind of tree is that?

28.AKIKI: It's used for making drums. It has special

qualities.

29.ISI: OK. Well, anyway, you started to get loud at one

point and then suddenly you screamed out Sesi's

name.

30.AKIKI: I did? I don't remember anything.

Oh oh! Here comes Mulogo. I'll go and look for

some wood and take Kiroko with me. See you

later Isi.

31.FOOTSTEPS APPROACHING.

Scene 4

32.SFX Same ambience as Scene 3(Daytime ambience. Cows/birds.)

(Throughout the following scene Isi is always negative and depressed. Mulogo is energetic and brash!)

33.MULOGO: Oh ... I sure scared her off!

34.ISI: I guess you are a bit over the top happy.

35.MULOGO: Oh sorry! So, no news from your dad or

brothers?

36.ISI: Nothing. And nothing from Akiki's family either.

Agh!Llet's not talk about it. (Big sigh) Your dad brought round a stove yesterday. My ma's been

cooking on it. That's quite a breakthrough!

37.MULOGO: What... the stove? Or the fact that our parents

are finally talking after years of silence?

38.ISI: (soft laugh) Both!

39.MULOGO: And what's special about this stove?

40.ISI: Your dad made it. Anyone can put it together

using local scrap metal and clay.

41.MULOGO: There you go again. Getting all excited about an

empty metal can and a clay chimney. Do you

really believe that things like that will solve

anything?

42.ISI: That stove needs half the wood that the

traditional metal stoves use. It's still about saving

the trees you know!

43.MULOGO: Then why use a stove that still needs wood to

burn? Can I tell you something Isi, something

that will blow your mind?

44.ISI: (dry sarcasm) You want to build a nuclear reactor in Abanto!

45.MULOGO: (upset) Very funny! If you're not going to take my ideas

seriously I'll go and talk to someone who will.

46.ISI: Sorry.

47.MULOGO: I keep saying, you shouldn't be so negative.

You'll never get anywhere Isi.

48.ISI: Look I'm allowed to feel sad .My father and

brothers could be dead, OK?

49.MULOGO: Ok. OK. But life goes on. Look I'm sorry...Do you

want me to go?

50.ISI: No. No. It's fine.

51.MULOGO: OK. Listen! I've got some great new ideas. I can

share them with you if you want.

52.ISI: Yes. Go ahead.

53.MULOGO: I'll say one word to you Isi: "bioenergy"

54.ISI: Bioenergy?

55.MULOGO: Bioenergy, biogas, biofuel.

56.ISI: That's three words.

57.MULOGO: And they do three great things: they provide heat

for cooking, light and a way to get rid of waste.

Listen...China and India have been using biogas

digesters for years.

58.ISI: Digesters? Sounds like a big stomach!

59.MULOGO: Exactly! They are a proven method...you need

the waste material from four humans and one or

two cows and that's enough for one digester to

produce enough energy for a household.

60.ISI: You use the dung and our...our....? Eeeee yuk!

61.MULOGO: Dung contains all sorts of useful minerals and

gases, so does human waste. The digester

processes all that muck...waste..old

food...anything...everything! Don't worry, it's

hidden underground but it produces enough fuel

and energy. And you can use the left-over waste

as fertilizer too...it is a multi-purpose, multi-

functional process.

62.ISI: Ai! How come you know all this stuff?

63.MULOGO: I go to the library in the office. There are books

and journals on bioenergy. If you're interested I'll

show you.

64.ISI: (laughing softly) I thought you only went when Chika was

there!

65.MULOGO: Hah! You misjudge me my friend. I am serious

about everything I do! The beauty of this is, it has

a future. It IS the future – and it already exists.

66.ISI: This is a huge leap for our people who are used

to burning wood and charcoal.

67.MULOGO: You say you want to save the trees? Then take

that leap! Oh...and by the way...in case you think

I am not...I am serious about Chika too!

68.MUSIC UP

Scene 5

69. SFX Daytime ambience (under a tree) Voices of women

70.CHIEF APALOO: (Whispering) Hallo MaKipko. Is it all right if I sit at the back and listen? I'm excited to hear what the women think!

71.MOTHER: (Whispering) Please. Be our guest. (Louder) Ladies. I'd like to declare the meeting open. I hope you will welcome Chief Apaloo who wishes to be an observer! He has come to learn how women conduct a democratic meeting!

72.POLITE LAUGHTER

73.MOTHER: And now, on our agenda today: posters warning

about water contamination and new ways of

cutting back on wood collection. Chika?

74.CHIKA: Here are the fifteen posters. Isingoma and Akiki

drew most of them. How do you like them?

75.SFX: POSTERS BEING SHOWN AROUND.....VOICES APPROVING POSTERS

76.CHIKA: Please tell your children to look at the posters

and only to drink from the ponds marked for

humans. The cows have their own demarcated

ponds.

77.MOTHER: We should all read them! So! On to our next item

on the agenda. We want to talk about our stoves

and the problem of wood collection. Who has

anything to say? Anyone? Yes, Madam Themba?

78.THEMBA: I hate looking for wood. I want to plant crops like

we did this morning.

79.CHIKA: I agree with Themba. It's a much better use of

our time and energy. All that backbreaking work

carrying wood for miles - it takes up a whole

morning. Just for one day's cooking.

80.MOTHER: I see young girls doing it. It is such a waste of

their time and talents. They should be at school

learning.

81.THEMBA: We are all suffering. And the wood makes so

much smoke. We all cough and are very sick.

82.MOTHER: Yes. I also hate crouching over my three-stone

stove. We should have more efficient stoves and

use our time for more productive work like

farming.

83.WOMEN APPROVE

84.CHIEF APALOO: Please excuse me. May I speak?

85.MOTHER: Of course. Go ahead.

86.CHIEF APALOO: I feel humbled hearing how difficult life is for you

women. Wood was easy to collect for my mother

but now you walk many miles and it is getting

harder. Thank you MaKipko for accepting to

demonstrate this stove. I hope you ladies agree,

it could save you effort and fuel.

87.MOTHER: Thank you Chief Apaloo. So...may I present ...

88. VOICES OF SURPRISE AND LAUGHTER

Scene 6

89.SFX Distant voices. Cow noises/mooing

90. LOW MUSIC UP SIGNALLING DANGER. HOLD UNDER (OPTIONAL!)

91.AKIKI: Kiroko. You must keep a secret. I am going to

look for the Lenge tree. I had a dream. I am sure

that my sister Sesi is there. I just have to find that

tree again, like the old man in MaKipko's story. It

is in the Abanto forest. And I know,...when I find

that tree, I will find my Sesi.
