INTRO:

Hello, dear listeners! Welcome to the third episode of our Learning by Ear radio drama "The Lost Kid – the Story of Single Mothers in Africa". In our last episode, Jonas and his two friends had decided to rob Mr. Kasu, the richest man in the suburb where they live. Also, the two friends and young mothers, Askale and Kassech quarrelled after Askale told Kassech to treat her child Begidu better. Let's see what happens in today's episode, "More than just a Game". We find the two young mothers in the local market where they sell their goods.

SCENE ONE: DAY TIME AT THE LOCAL MARKET

1. ATMO: LOCAL MARKET, ATMO OUTSIDE,

TRAFFIC NOISES

KW begin

2. Buyer: This charcoal seems easy to burn.

3. Kassech: Sure! It's from the Acacia tree. Here it is. Hold

out your plastic bag, please.

4. SFX: CHARCOAL THROWN INTO A PLASTIC

BAG

5. Buyer: Here's your money.

6. SFX: COINS DROPPING INTO HANDS

7. Buyer: But you have to put a little bit more charcoal in

my bag; I'm a long time customer of yours.

8. Kassech: I know, but as you know, many things have just

gotten too expensive these days. Anyway,

here's some more.

9. SFX: CHARCOAL THROWN INTO PLASTIC BAG

10. Buyer: (as she leaves) Thanks! I'll come back

tomorrow, too.

KW end

11. Askale: (comes close) No one has come to buy some

of my homemade bread yet. Today is your day,

Kassech. You've sold almost all of your

charcoal.

12. Kassech: (Adamant) Yes, Askale.

13. Askale: Sorry about the guarrel yesterday.

14. Kassech: It's OK!

15. Askale: By the way, my son Samy is doing well at

school.

16. Kassech: (without interests) | see.

17. Askale: I met our teacher from evening school and he

asked after you. Why don't you start going to

evening classes again?

18. Kassech: (Angrily) Could you please mind your own business! When I sell my charcoal, I earn enough money to pay the rent, and to buy things my child needs! That's enough!

19. Askale: OK! OK!

20. NARRATOR: Askale is very worried that her strong friendship with Kassech is slowly breaking apart, just because she keeps giving Kassech advice about how to care for her child. On the other hand, Kassech can't understand why Askale keeps telling her how to raise her son, Begidu. Elsewhere, Kassech's younger brother Jonas is sitting outside playing cards with his two friends, Challa and Mekete.

SCENE TWO: AFTERNOON IN THE SUBURB

21. SFX: OUTSIDE, THUNDER AND BOLT IN THE DISTANCE

22. SFX: SHUFFLING, CARDS BEING MIXED

23. Jonas: This weather is really strange!

24. Challa: Yes, no one can tell when it's going to start to

rain.

25. Mekete: Whatever! If it starts to rain, we'll run for

shelter. Guys, forget about the rain, and let's

keep playing our game. Here are your cards.

26. SFX: FLIP OVER CARDS

27. Challa: Hey, people! Look over there!

28. Mekete: What! Oh! Aster.

29. Challa: Papa Tilahun's granddaughter!

30. Mekete: (panics) What if she knows that we'd planned

on robbing her grandpa?

31. Challa: Hey! Not so loud! She's coming over to us!

32. SFX: FOOTSTEPS APPROACH

33. Aster: Hi! Jonas.

34. Jonas: (Nervous) Hi! A...A...Aster.

35. Mekete and Challa: (Giggling).

36. Aster: Did you hear what happened to your nephew?

37. Jonas: No, what happened to Begidu?

38. Aster: Two days ago, I found him in our kitchen. It

was raining and very cold outside. He slept so

close to the fire he was almost in the glowing

ash!

39. All Three: What!?

40. Aster: It's true, I am telling you. And your sister wasn't

at home.

41. Jonas: She's stupid!

42. Aster: Then, I brought him to bed at our place. Begidu

is a very cute little boy.

43. Jonas: Thanks! Please keep an eye out for him.

44. Aster: That's OK. Bye!

45. Jonas: Bye!

46. SFX: FOOTSTEPS LEAVE

KW begin

47. Challa: (teases Jonas) Uiiii. To bad that she didn't

bring you to bed, Jonas.

48. Mekete: (Laughs) A...A...Aster!

49. Both: (Laugh)

50. Jonas: Stop it!

KW end

51. SFX: STARTS TO RAIN

52. SFX: FOOTSTEPS OF THE THREE BOYS LEAVE

53. NARRATOR: While Aster leaves in one direction, the three teenagers run in the other direction to find shelter from the sudden rain. That evening, Kassech has to deal with Begidu's problems again. Her son has started his first year of school and he isn't doing very well. And as usual, back at home, Kassech can't find the right words to talk to her son about his problems at school.

SCENE THREE: AT NIGHT AT KASSECH'S HOUSE

54. SFX. FLIPPING PAPERS

55. Kassech: (Angrily) How can you do so badly? Look,

what is this a picture of?

56. Begidu: (With fear) It is a cat.

57. Kassech: (Mocking at him) "It is a cat." Spell it out!

58. Begidu: K...A...T

59. Kassech: (Very angry) What is K...A...T...?

60. Begidu: Cat.

61. Kassech:

No! It is not (spells the letters) K...A...T...!

Rather, it is spelled C...A...T! It's a cat! I tell

you, you would be better off if spent time

learning instead of rambling around town telling

everybody that you don't get enough food to

eat! You're a wild cat! Go to sleep now!

62. Begidu: Mama, why do you always insult and beat me?

63. Kassech: Don't speak back to me! I said, go to sleep.

64. Begidu: (He cries while he leaves).

65. NARRATOR: What is wrong with Kassech? Actually, Kassech doesn't hate her son. But like many other young single mothers, she isn't sure of the right way to bring up her child. Kassech seems to be overwhelmed with the many challenges she faces in her daily life. And amid all the stress, she can't see how important proper care and education are for the development of the child's brain and personality. As long as Kassech continues to insult and beat Begidu, she will slow his development too. In contrast, Kassech's friend Askale takes her responsibilities as a mother very seriously. That is why Begidu lies crying in his bed, while Askale's son Samy plays and laughs with his mother just next door.

SCENE THREE: AT NIGHT AT ASKALE'S HOUSE

66. SFX: NIGHT AMBIENCES

67. Askale: (Tickles Samy)

68. Samy: (Laughs) mum, stop it! Stop it.

69. Askale: You're my good boy! Now, it's time for...

70. Samy: Learning!

71. Askale: Very good! Even though you learn at school,

you need to keep on learning in the evenings.

Now, while you're studying, I'll winnow the

wheat for my bread, OK.

72. SFX: POURING GRAINS ON A WINNOWING TRAY

73. Samy: OK, Mum. Can I have some bread after you

have baked it tomorrow?

74. Askale: Sure! But I've also got some bread here that I

brought back from the market. I didn't sell all of

the bread today. Are you hungry? Would you

like some?

75. Samy: No, not now, later. Now I've got to study.

76. Askale: Good boy! By the way, why is studying so

important?

77. Samy: I don't know?!

78. Askale: To get good marks, my dear Samy. But keep in

mind - you don't just learn to have good marks,

you also learn for life.

79. SFX: WINNOWING THE GRAINS

80. Askale: You see, your good grades are the result of our

good teamwork.

81. Samy: Our teamwork?

82. Askale: Yes Samy. If you hadn't asked me about things

that you didn't understand very well, and if I hadn't explained it to you properly, then you wouldn't understand these things now. You

always have to ask for help.

83. Samy: OK, let me ask you something that I don't

understand then.

84. Askale: Go ahead!

85. Samy: Why do I go to school? Why don't I play

outside with my friends?

86. Askale: You see, if you go to school, you learn more.

87. Samy: So why don't my friends go to school?

88. Askale: They do go. Your friend Begidu, for example,

always goes to school.

89. Samy: Yes, but the others don't go. Why not?

90. Askale: Well, their families can't send them.

91. Samy: Why can't they send them?

92. Askale: Perhaps they can't afford it.

93. Samy: Why can't they afford it?

94. Askale: Oh Samy, you ask a lot of questions.

95. Samy: But mum, you just told me to always ask when

I don't understand something.

96. Askale: Yes, yes, you see, most of them don't have

enough money to send their children to school.

97. Samy: Do you have enough money, mum?

98. Askale: Oh! Thank God! It's enough for both of us.

99. Samy: How do you earn enough money for both of us

then?

100. Askale: From the bread that I always bake at home and

sell at the local market.

101. Askale: (Winnows).

102. SFX: WINNOWING THE GRAINS

103. Samy: Can I help you, mum by winnowing the wheat?

Then you can earn even more money!

104. Askale: (laughs) Thanks a lot Samy, but you

concentrate on your studies, and if you find

something that you don't understand, you ask

me straight away, OK?

105. Samy: OK, mum, I will.

106. Askale: Good boy! (Winnowing).

107. SFX: WINNOWING THE GRAINS

OUTRO:

As you already know, the two friends Askale and Kassech share many similarities. They are about the same age; they both didn't finish school and they both have the same kind of job selling goods at the market. However, each of them treats her child very differently. Where do you think this will lead to? Will Begidu continue to bear his mother's negligence and humiliations?
