Supporting local media for a stronger and well-informed Armenia

DW Akademie, in partnership with BBC Media Action, Democracy Development Foundation, Hetq, and Factor TV, is implementing the project "European Media Facility in Armenia" supported by the European Union and the Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development (BMZ).

The three-year project aims to strengthen the media sector in Armenia, enabling it to serve as a watchdog for Armenian society. The project works directly with media managers, regional media outlets, independent journalists, fact-checkers, young journalists, and students.

The range of our activities over the last three years

- Over 150 days of workshops, consultations and trainings
- 220.000 € in grants to 10 regional media partners
- Around 300 articles created by supported regional media
- New "InFact" fact-checking network with over
 700 members online
- 360 fact-checking and investigative reports published
- 54 media professionals trained in the e-school for media managers
- 37 students participated in the student development programme

Fact-based information and reporting during crises

The proliferation of false and misleading information has been a problem in Armenia's media landscape for many years. The unprecedented challenges since 2020, however, have exacerbated the country's vulnerability to disinformation.

The European Media Facility in Armenia is supporting Armenian media's efforts to deal with the consequences of these crises. Confronting the power of disinformation and providing balanced and trustworthy information is key to continuing recovery, building trust between citizens and the state, and safeguarding the country's commitment to a democratic future.

- 115 professional media materials produced by participating students
- Over 250 people engaged in 24 audience research sessions
- 3 in-depth research publications throughout the project
- 45 journalists in 3 study experiences in London and Bonn
- 2 studios and media spaces renovated or provided with equipment
- Over 50 teachers, trainers, and lecturers trained in online teaching and participative methods
