

# 11:03 DocFilm Bitter Rice - China's Youth Reeducation Centers

Chinese juvenile detention centers are notoriously harsh. Young people end up there for criminal offenses or because their parents can't cope with their rebellious children. The film follows young people in one of these institutions. There is no way out, every step is monitored and to survive you have to be loyal to the system, not to your friends. This is no Orwellian nightmare, but the "Peach Reform School", a Chinese juvenile detention center. The documentary, which was filmed at the school for over a year, provides deeply disturbing insights into the Chinese juvenile detention system. From the frightened 11-year-old Wenjun to the secret teenage lovers Lei-gong and Chanjuan to the rough, but ambivalent teacher Zhou Hai. The intimate access to these characters reveals victims in a system that values obedience and order over love and friendship.

# 00:02 DocFilm Bringing Criminal Puppy Traders to Heel

Experts estimate that Europe's dog mafia makes around a billion Euros every year. Birgitt Thiesmann from the animal welfare foundation "Four Paws" fights against the illegal puppy trade.

The activist follows the trail of this business all over Europe. She talks to animal sanctuaries, police, vets and duped buyers. "I've been physically attacked and of course, you receive threats," says Birgitt Thiesmann, "that's just simply part of the job." For more than 20 years, Birgitt worked as a reporter for the German youth magazine "Bravo". After writing a reportage on the illegal puppy trade in Europe, she joined "Four Paws". Since then, she's been part of the fight against criminal traders. Experts estimate they earn around one billion Euros selling puppies in Europe. This makes the illegal puppy trade just as lucrative as the criminal trade in drugs, weapons or women.

"The puppies are usually terminally ill. They're not vaccinated or wormed and many of them die straight after they've been sold," says Birgitt, who maintains contact with many duped and shocked buyers. She regularly follows the tracks left by criminal puppy traders across the continent. In Prague, she meets someone who quit the business. The woman used to be what's known as a "multiplier" - animal activists describe these outfits as "puppy mills" and never as "breeding". Birgitt's hoping to glean some new insider information and isn't disappointed: she hears about another, so far undiscovered "multiplier station" not far from Prague. "This has nothing at all to do with responsible breeding," says Birgitt.

She sees the consequences all over Europe: overcrowded animal shelters in Germany and puppies displaying challenging behavior in the kennels of Belgian dog handlers. Nevertheless: Birgitt and her fellow campaigners are making a difference, albeit on a small scale. Posing as a potential buyer, she tips off vets and the police and catches puppy traders red-handed, confiscating dogs that have evidently been smuggled into Germany.

# We Come from the Cedar Tree - Life in Canada's Great Bear Rainforest

Canada's Great Bear Rainforest is a place where the rainforest and Pacific Ocean meet. This special forest is home to countless spruce and fir trees. One very special species towers above them all, giving many animals shelter: the giant arbor vitae, or 'Tree of Life'.

The proud giant, which can live for up to a thousand years, plays an important role in the mythology of the Nuxalk. These indigenous people communicate with their ancestors through the tree. But the tree of life also plays a key role in the ecosystem and is home to numerous species - from the smallest insects to stately mammals. The animals crawl into its trunk or find shelter under its bushy foliage.

The giant arbor vitae has watched over the Canadian rainforest and the adjacent ocean for thousands of years. Every fall, the salmon return to their native rivers in the middle of the Great Bear Rainforest after spending several years at sea. They fight their way upstream to spawn - and provide a feast for the bears, who devour the delicious fish in the shade of the trees.

Nothing is lost in the forest. Scavengers feed on any remains left among the tree roots and whatever is left nourishes the rich forest soil with nitrogen and phosphorus. Thus, even the salmon promote tree growth and contribute to a unique ecosystem.

Forest and ocean live in symbiosis here. When heavy rainfall erodes the soil, nutrients are transported through the rivers to the sea, where they benefit the humpback whales. Nowadays, however, this complex ecosystem is threatened by massive logging. Here, too, humans are jeopardizing a balance that has existed for thousands of years.

# Frontex Under Scrutiny - Can the EU Border Agency Clean Up its Act?

Frontex. For many, a name bound up with scandals, cover-ups and human rights violations. Headlines like these long tarnished the EU's border protection agency's reputation. But now, it's trying to wipe the slate clean with a new boss, a new image and greater transparency. The message now? That scandals are a thing of a past. The documentary asks: Is this true? A team of journalists films at the Frontex headquarters in Warsaw, as officials discover boats with migrants in the Mediterranean. How is the agency dealing with these? The new head of Frontex, Hans Leijtens, explains the new strategy, while former employees report on past failures. The film also follows former Frontex chief Fabrice Leggeri during the election campaign in France. He's said to be responsible for many of the scandals - and now sits in the EU Parliament for the far right. The documentary also investigates claims of recent illegal

All around the world, entrepreneurs and scientists are looking for a way out of factory farming. They're concerned by the issue of animal welfare. But a primary motive is the ecological impact of industrial livestock farming. Industrial livestock farming is responsible for around 15 percent of global greenhouse gas emissions. It also requires huge amounts of land and water and is thought to be contributing to the rise in antibiotic-resistant infections in humans. This is why more and more scientists and entrepreneurs are conducting research on alternatives to conventional meat production.

In California, Joshua Tetrick is working on a method of growing meat in a bioreactor. He multiplies the muscle cells of chickens in huge tanks and cultivates them with plant-based nutrients. The resulting cell pulp is molded into fibrous meat with the help of a plant scaffold. A kilo still costs many hundreds of dollars. But Joshua Tetrick hopes that production can be scaled up to a globally relevant level. After all, with 'Good Meat' he was one of the first two companies in the USA to receive a license for cultured meat.

At the University of California, Alison Van Eenennaam is trying to make meat production more efficient. Using the gene editing tool CRISPR she's altered the genetic make-up of a cow so that its offspring are exclusively male. This is a great advantage, as male calves grow faster and consume fewer resources than female calves to produce the same amount of meat - thereby reducing the carbon footprint of livestock farming.

For Pasi Vainikka from 'Solar Foods' in Helsinki, these are all just intermediate steps on the way to a truly sustainable future food: he's cultivating a whole new category of food in gigantic fermenters: Bacteria that are fed with CO2 and hydrogen and blended to create a product called 'Solein'. A flavorless, protein-rich basic ingredient that can replace eggs and milk in practically all foods.

Science journalist Ingolf Baur meets some of the researchers and entrepreneurs seeking alternatives to industrial livestock farming around the world.

Before the Taliban's return, a brief hope was ignited. Could Afghanistan become a more just country? A group of Afghan women sat at the negotiating table. Although it was life-threatening for them to raise their voices against the Taliban's misogynistic regime, they never gave up hope of preserving the women of Afghanistan's hard-won rights. The team's intelligence, perseverance and bravery in the face of a hopeless situation are characteristic, when it comes to women around the world who fight for both peace and equality. But the Taliban were not interested in a democratic, free society in which girls and women have basic rights and can go to school, study or work. After decades of war and chaos, Afghanistan has become safer under the Taliban. But the price for women is high: they have paid with their freedom.

# 10:30 DocFilm When the World Stood Still

Covid-19 was officially declared a pandemic on 11 March 2020. The deadly disease spread so quickly around the world that it could not be contained with known measures. It was the beginning of a two-year state of emergency. To many, it felt like something out of a disaster movie. This film relates how a number of people across Europe dealt with the crisis. Initially, the world was gripped by fear of this unknown virus that spread through the air that we breathe. In countries like Italy, the number of deaths rose so fast that medical personnel and undertakers were quickly overwhelmed.

The public was sympathetic and supportive. People came out onto their balconies every evening to applaud the efforts of hospital staff. They were clapping for people like Carlo Mosca, a doctor in Brescia, Italy, who spent the first few months of the pandemic in hospital almost non-stop, caring for patients. Many of them died alone, as social distancing rules meant visitors were not allowed. Carlo Mosca didn't see his family for months so as not to infect them.

When the first wave of the virus subsided, governments across Europe eased restrictions again. After a brief respite, further waves and restrictions followed, but by now, people were growing accustomed to the changes in their daily lives. However, things took a dramatic turn for Carlo Mosca. He was arrested in January 2021 and accused of murdering two patients with coronavirus to free up beds. Carlo Mosca had to remain under house arrest during the trial - while outside, life seemed to be returning to normal.

By now there was a general sense of relief - but it was short-lived. The number of infections shot up again in the fall. Many countries, including France, went back into lockdown. The film follows Aurélie Rhumeur as she and her husband Yves Chuop try to keep their Paris pharmacy running, home-school their daughter Cassandre and provide emotional support while keeping their own fears under control. Like all the protagonists in the documentary, Aurélie films herself - thus providing deep insight into a family life that is slowly disintegrating due to isolation and uncertainty over how long the state of emergency will last.

As the pandemic entered its second year, no one was applauding anymore. Expressions of solidarity gave way to those of frustration and anger. People across Europe took to the streets in anti-government protests, as conspiracy myths spread. Emotions were running high and only slightly eased by the development of a coronavirus vaccination. People were questioning the price they paid for efforts at protection against a deadly virus. Was it too high?

# **New Perspectives Through Protheses**

For people with disabilities in Uganda, there's little medical care available. It's often a long way to travel to see a doctor, and treatment is expensive. But an organization from Germany is providing those affected with orthopedic aids, as well as training specialists.

In Uganda, people with disabilities not only often live in great poverty, there's also hardly any medical care available to them. For more than 10 years now, an organization from Usingen in the German state of Hesse has been providing people with prostheses and other orthopedic aids. In the small town of Kiyunga near the capital Kampala, ProUganda has set up a center with a modern orthopedic workshop and treatment rooms. But not everyone can get there: The roads are uneven and it's difficult for poor families to get to Kiyunga with their children. That's why the team travels

to rural areas in minibuses. In the trunk: wheelchairs, some delivered second-hand from Germany, some bought with donations. The film accompanies members of the aid organization as they work with patients in Kiyunga, in the workshop and on missions in the region.

#### The Rise of Hindu Nationalism

Since Narendra Modi came to power, Hindu nationalism has played an increasingly important role in India. In this ideology, minorities are regarded as second-class citizens. Hindu militias are spreading fear and terror, on the subcontinent and beyond.

What has become of the world's largest democracy? What happened to the legacy of Mahatma Gandhi? The discourse has changed: The father of Indian independence is now criticized, while his murderer, a Hindu extremist, is revered.

Narendra Modi's accession to power in 2014 marked a turning point in Indian history. For the Modi regime, ethnicity is key. The ideology behind this radical change is Hindu nationalism, also known as Hindutva. Hindutva emerged in the 1920s, in the tradition of Italian fascism and National Socialism.

Hindutva is at odds with the long tradition of religious pluralism in India, as the ideology strives for a nation consisting exclusively of Hindus. This means that the 300 million-strong minority of Muslims, Christians, Sikhs and Buddhists are no longer safe.

Attacks on Christians have increased by 400 percent since 2014. In some federal states, freedom of speech is restricted and teachers are no longer allowed to talk about paradise or hell in class - under threat of imprisonment. The systemic violence is primarily directed against Muslims. Universities, media and NGOs are no longer a counterweight to the nationalist government, as freedom of speech is often curtailed.

However, extremist Hindu groups exist in more than 150 countries. Especially in the US and Britain, brutal attacks provoked by the Hindu diaspora within the Indian community have increased significantly in recent times.

The documentary sheds light on this disturbing development and questions the extent to which India still deserves to be called "the world's largest democracy".

More and more people are taking the migratory route through Belarus - and disappearing without a trace. Relatives from their home countries, such as Iraq, Syria and Egypt, are looking for them. Polish volunteers offer their support in what is often a distressing endeavor.

The migration route through Belarus to Poland is an established one, despite the presence of a border fence, heavily armed guards and reports of increasing brutality in what is effectively an exclusion zone. Although it may be considered safer than trying to cross the Mediterranean or the Atlantic, people following this route to Europe are also dying with increasing regularity.

They perish in the forests and swamps between Poland and Belarus, thousands of kilometers away from their home countries and desperate families who often have no idea what's happened to their loved ones. But one group of people living in the Podlaskie border region is concerned with the fate of the dead and missing. They try to help the relatives to identify their family members. The film follows the story of Mohammed Sabah's family, as they try to find what's happened to him.

Mohammed left his home in Erbil, the capital of the autonomous region of Kurdistan in Iraq, in the fall of 2021. In November 2021, he got held up in the neutral zone between Poland and Belarus and after a few weeks, was pushed back to Belarus by Polish border guards. Mohammed contacted his family for the last time at the beginning of December. He kept in touch through his uncle Rekaut, who's lived in London for 15 years. There was no sign of life from Mohammed until October 2022, when a video emerged, allegedly showing Mohammed crossing the border fence into Poland.

All hope now lies with Mohammed's uncle Rekaut, who maintains contact with the authorities and NGOs on behalf of the family and goes to Poland whenever he can. In Erbil, Mohammed's family desperately hopes he's still alive - but at the very least, they just want to know his fate.

# Swindlers in the Business World - Crypto Bankruptcy, 'WeCrashed' and the Wirecard Case

Anyone can steal a handbag. But a business coup requires more: charisma, persuasiveness, tenacity and a lot of social savvy. Maybe it's no wonder the white-collar perpetrators behind giant scams are difficult to catch. Not everything is illegal. Some of the recent scandals came about thanks to schemes that were nothing short of ingenious. Sometimes, these schemes even fooled financial professionals at the top of their game.

The scammers like to conceal their tricks behind columns of figures and P.O. box addresses, behind company networks and dummy corporations. Sam Bankman-Fried was celebrated as a "poster boy for crypto"; his company "FTX" was among the largest crypto exchanges in the world. But then that world began to implode -- and the entrepreneur was indicted on several charges, including money laundering and fraud.

Businessman Adam Neumann used to have a net worth of 14 billion dollars. He set up the workspace giant "WeWork". But his extravagant lifestyle eventually caught up with him -- and resulted in the cancellation of the start-up's planned IPO.

Jan Marsalek is seen as the mastermind of the Wirecard scandal. While members of his former executive team stand trial, Marsalek is on the run. Did he manage to set aside millions for life after the collapse of Wirecard?

The documentary "Swindlers in the Business World" explores the most spectacular cases of recent years, with experts explaining the scammers' most effective strategies.

#### The Missing Van Gogh

One of the most famous paintings by Vincent van Gogh was sold at auction in 1990 - before disappearing without trace. What has happened to it? The search has taken investigators from the US, to France, Germany, Austria and Switzerland.

Six weeks before his death in 1890, van Gogh painted a portrait of his physician Paul Ferdinand Gachet. The doctor's melancholic demeanor, described by the artist himself as "the heartbroken expression of our time", has afforded the work iconic status.

In 1990, 100 years after its creation, the portrait was auctioned in New York for 82 million US Dollars, the highest price ever paid for a work of art at the time. Then, it disappeared into private ownership. Where is it now? Those who know the answer aren't willing to talk.

In pursuing leads as to the whereabouts of the work, this documentary not only explores the excesses of the global art trade, it also sheds light on the emotional connections that people have formed with the portrait.

Should children be punished for the crimes of their parents? Hundreds of children of members of Islamic State (IS) are stuck in Syrian camps. Often, with no hope of returning to their home nations. Around 38,000 foreign nationals - more than 60 per cent of whom are children - are being held in Al-Hol and Roj, two closed, sprawling camps in north-eastern Syria that have been holding mostly spouses, other adult female relatives and children of male IS suspects since 2019. Most of the children are under 14 years old and many have spent most, if not all, of their lives in the camps. Some countries, including Finland, Sweden, Russia, Germany and the USA, have allowed the repatriation of IS children. But France has taken a different position, refusing to repatriate the children, unless they are orphaned. In France, their families are waging a fierce battle against the government to bring these children home.

#### The Power of Peatlands - Climate Protection from Moors

Peatlands bind more carbon than forests. But in Germany, almost all the country's natural peatlands have been drained. Now, they're emitting greenhouse gases. People around the world are currently working to rewet the moors - while keeping them usable for agriculture. Dry peatlands are responsible for seven percent of all greenhouse gas emissions in Germany. Taken together, all the moorland areas in Germany cover over 1.5 million hectares. However, much of this moorland has given way to pasture and arable land over the centuries. Drained, the moors lose their ability to store greenhouse gases. In Germany alone, they could store about as much carbon as the entire German forest - but they must remain wet.

Scientists Greta Gaudig and Sabine Wichmann from the "Greifswald Moor Centrum" are working on a strategy to rewet the moors, while keeping them usable for agriculture. To accomplish this, they are testing the cultivation of peat mosses and cattails. These materials could be used to produce environmentally friendly potting soil and building materials. This way, farmers could continue generating income while saving the moors.

In Bristol, young entrepreneurs are producing a sustainable down substitute using cattails. With success: because the product is selling well, several farmers in England are converting their drained fields back to wet moorland for farming. For the first time, they have found a way to protect the moors and continue to make a living from their land.

# The Cyber-Bullying Cartel

For the first time, a documentary film penetrates deep into the most extreme levels of online hate. Cyberbullies engage in a series of campaigns intended to provoke an intense emotional reaction from the victim. The film explores some of their most perfidious methods.

Tens of thousands of people have an Internet-based hobby. A cruel game that plays on online anonymity and looks something like this: Cyberbullies home in on victims through social media channels and begin goading them into online emotional outbursts. And clock up each one of these outbursts as a triumph.

The group profiled in the film has a hierarchical structure and calls itself the NWO, an abbreviation for "New World Order" or also "Nie Wieder Online", or "Never Again Online". Members meet on the communication platform Discord, allocate their tasks and brag about their activities online. Some hack accounts to access personal data, others order pizzas or packages en masse in the name of the victims.

#### Iran - Faces of Anger

Filmed in secret, this documentary is a behind-the-scenes look at the "Woman, Life, Freedom" uprising in Iran. The story begins a few weeks after the death of Jina Mahsa Amini, a young Kurdish student who died on 16 September 2022.

She had allowed a few strands of hair to escape from her veil. Members of the Iranian morality police beat her so severely that she died of her injuries. The regime in Tehran has denied all responsibility for her death, which triggered nationwide mass protests under a slogan that echoed all around the world: "Woman, Life, Freedom".

Iranian filmmaker Shorresh Afkari filmed in secret, smuggling the footage out of the country to a colleague in France. His documentary gives a voice to people who, like large sections of the Iranian population, have run out of strength and patience.

For example, the film observes a young couple who dream of being able to express their love openly and in complete freedom. We also meet a taxi driver, who ends up in prison as a bitter opponent of the regime. His mother tries to protect him at all costs. A painter continues to practise her art despite censorship; a doctor secretly treats demonstrators. A young man is prepared to do anything for cash, even sell one of his kidneys. Just like men who dare to protest, women who show their hair in public and publicly oppose the regime still face harsh punishment, including the death penalty. For this reason, many interviewees speak off-camera to protect their anonymity.

#### **Cut, Uncut - Male Circumcision**

Removal of the foreskin is the most common operation performed on male children worldwide. Male circumcision is done for religious, cultural or medical reasons.

In Africa, the WHO used male circumcision in the fight against AIDS. But more and more doctors say that the harm done by the procedure outweighs any medical benefits, and that this surgery is performed far too often. Those affected are increasingly daring to go public, demanding that boys, too, be protected from circumcisions that are not medically necessary. Advocates say their right to physical integrity must be preserved. But few take it as far as Florian. He's sure that his circumcision as a child

wasn't medically necessary. Moreover, his parents were not informed about alternative options. He's taking his case to court.

The film explores the question of when circumcision actually makes medical sense, and critically questions the ethics of this millennia-old practice.

### Rivers at Risk - The Global Water Crisis Unveiled - Part 1

Water is scarce, but global demand continues to rise. Humanity is facing serious disputes over our most important resource. What impact is our lifestyle having on our planet's water cycles?

Along six rivers on four continents, the documentary explores the question of why this vital resource, water, is becoming increasingly scarce - and who's responsible. 70 per cent of fresh water is used in agriculture. And a large proportion of this goes into the production of animal feed. Our excessive meat consumption is partly to blame for the fact that mighty rivers such as the Spanish Ebro or the Colorado in the USA and Mexico are drying up. Factory farming businesses are worth billions to major agricultural companies, but this overuse of water often goes hand in hand with its pollution. Europe has outsourced its dirtiest industries to countries such as India. Around 20 per cent of global water pollution is caused by the textile industry. The film provides rare insights into Indian factories and life in the places where contaminants are discharged.

But it's not all bad news. In the film, we also meet people who've come up with solutions. In France, dams are dismantled to revitalize rivers; in an Egyptian oasis the inhabitants experiment with hydroponics; and in India, an individual known as the "water man" uses a millennia-old technique to coax rivers from deserts that dried up decades ago.

Prolonged periods of drought are threatening the land and the culture of the Turkana-Ngaremara people in northern Kenya. In the shadow of tribal conflicts and the climate crisis, orphaned shepherd boy Kolei questions his identity as a warrior.

During a period of record low rainfall in northern Kenya, the Turkana tribe faces growing violent clashes with rival tribes and encroaching wild predators hunting their livestock. Kolei, a sensitive shepherd boy whose name translates to 'living amongst the goats', waits impatiently to begin his journey as a traditional warrior. But when he fails a crucial test, he loses the respect of older warriors and is forced to withdraw from the community, disappointed and isolated. There's still no rain and the climate crisis becomes an imminent threat. As more and more wild predators tear through his family's livestock, Kolei is determined to do something about it. And he sees an opportunity to regain his reputation, within his community.

The documentary was filmed over four consecutive years during this unprecedented period of drought. With unprecedented and intimate access to the Turkana people, this moving coming-of-age story reveals the grave threats facing one of the world's oldest communities.

### **Top-Flight Medical Care for Horses**

A special veterinary clinic in the northern German town of Lüsche is a global destination for horse owners. They flock here, thanks to head surgeon Dr. Jan Hein Swagemakers' minimally invasive surgery - a technique he learned operating on humans.

Sometimes, the ailing horse travels to the clinic by plane. After landing at Frankfurt Airport, the four-legged patients are received at the Animal Lounge by horse farmer Vanessa Wilkens. There, they get some R&R after their long flight.

Then, as many as three horses are crammed into a narrow transport box. From Frankfurt, they're taken to riding competitions and their new owners - as well as to Dr Swagemakers' operating theatre.

His specialty is the widening of a constricted nerve canal in the neck. This operation allows sick horses to trot and jump again withoutstumbling, or feeling pain. The 63-year-old Swagemakers is a luminary in the world of equine medicine. The surgeon also serves as the official team vet, for the German show jumping squad.

For the owners of mare Quiwi on the Swiss border, Swagemakers' expertise is their last hope. For them, the cost of having their horse transported to Lüsche is worthwhile.

The film explores the work of one of Europe's largest and most modern equine clinics, where the specialist vet meets clients with great expectations, and even an greater love for their horses.

### Turmoil in Panama - Navigating Crises at the Canal

Panama's famous canal connects the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans. But, this important gateway for world trade is increasingly blocked. Cargo ships often have to wait weeks for passage, because water levels in the canal are too low. The cause? Drought.

Every day, 40 ships pass through the Panama Canal, carrying one-and-a-half million tons of cargo. The authorities are prepared to do just about anything to preserve the valuable canal. It is, after all, Panama's main source of income. They regularly pump as much water from the country's reserves as possible into the canal. This water is needed to operate the locks. But it is also drinking water, and the population relies on it. For every ship that passes through, 100 million liters of freshwater flow into the sea.

At the height of the crisis, over 163 ships had to drop anchor. More and more container ships therefore prefer to bypass the Panama Canal, even if it means taking a long detour. For those in a hurry, there is a solution. The canal authority auctions off emergency passages. These can cost up to four million dollars, 40 times the normal rate.

Panama is an important transit route for goods. But it's also part of a dangerous human migration route. In 2023, half a million men, women and children risked their lives on the waterway trying to reach North America. Despite the risks, more migrants arrive every year.

### My Body. My Gut. - The Underappreciated Control Center

The intestine is a true marvel. This organ's complex functions extend far beyond the mere processing of food. The intestine affects the immune system and also has a powerful effect on our emotional well-being.

If a person's gut is doing well, that person is doing well. If the gut is doing poorly, however, it can lead to chronic inflammation -- or depression. So, what can be done to protect and strengthen the gut?

This documentary follows people for whom the gut plays a special role in their lives. They speak openly about what is sometimes a taboo subject. Jana Eberhart has a stressful everyday life. The student works as a model and is a passionate about sports. In fact, she's about to take part in an Ironman competition. Can a change in diet strengthen her gut so that she can perform better? Sports and nutrition consultant Dr. Jens Freese accompanies Jana on her project over an extended period of time. What impact will dietary changes and other interventions have?

For actor and fitness influencer Philipp Stehler, careful management of the gut is essential. He lives with ulcerative colitis, a chronic intestinal inflammation condition. This disease almost cost him his life. His large intestine had to be surgically removed. Philipp Stehler talks openly about his life then and now. While his diet used to consist mainly of meat and protein shakes, he now eats a vegan diet and practices yoga and meditation every day.

Carina Speck has been living with irritable bowel syndrome or IBS for 13 years. Bloating, diarrhea and stomach cramps accompany her in everything she does. But the social media manager doesn't want to isolate herself because of it. On Instagram and TikTok, she gives tips on things like traveling with IBS. Dr. Miriam Stengel from SRH Klinikum Sigmaringen guides her, with recommendations on how she can get a better handle on her symptoms.

Earth is constantly under attack. The culprit? Asteroids, which regularly hurtle towards our planet. Often, they only just miss hitting us. The consequences of a collision could be catastrophic: 66 million years ago, an asteroid wiped out the dinosaurs.

The collision of a 10-kilometer asteroid with our planet 66 million years ago triggered a mass extinction. 75 percent of all life on earth was wiped out - plants and animals, alike. The dinosaurs became extinct. Since then, the asteroids that have hit our planet have been much smaller. The damage they have caused has been limited. But scientists warn that another apocalyptic collision could be inevitable.

This alarming scenario is not just material for feature films like "Armageddon" or "Deep Impact". International scientists and decision-makers are now taking this threat very seriously. For several years, they've been cataloging the asteroids and meteorites that could one day cross the Earth's orbit.

To date, an estimated 25,000 near-Earth asteroids threaten our planet. Cosmic bodies with a diameter of more than 140 meters are under particular scrutiny, as they could trigger catastrophes on a planetary scale. To prevent a possible apocalypse, space agencies are developing international defense programs.

In this documentary, planetary scientists, astrophysicists and engineers from the Japanese and European space agencies present the strategies they are adopting to protect our planet.

### Rivers at Risk - The Global Water Crisis Unveiled - Part 2

Water is scarce, but global demand continues to rise. Humanity is facing serious disputes over our most important resource. What impact is our lifestyle having on our planet's water cycles?

Along six rivers on four continents, the documentary explores the question of why this vital resource, water, is becoming increasingly scarce - and who's responsible. 70 per cent of fresh water is used in agriculture. And a large proportion of this goes into the production of animal feed. Our excessive meat consumption is partly to blame for the fact that mighty rivers such as the Spanish Ebro or the Colorado in the USA and Mexico are drying up. Factory farming businesses are worth billions to major agricultural companies, but this overuse of water often goes hand in hand with its pollution. Europe has outsourced its dirtiest industries to countries such as India. Around 20 per cent of global water pollution is caused by the textile industry. The film provides rare insights into Indian factories and life in the places where contaminants are discharged.

But it's not all bad news. In the film, we also meet people who've come up with solutions. In France, dams are dismantled to revitalize rivers; in an Egyptian oasis the inhabitants experiment with hydroponics; and in India, an individual known as the "water man" uses a millennia-old technique to coax rivers from deserts that dried up decades ago.

#### Armenia - A Pawn Between Superpowers

Armenia, a former Soviet republic, is located in the South Caucasus. Since the early 20th century, the mountainous country has been the scene of geopolitical conflicts.

Armenia, and the Nagorno-Karabakh region that once belonged to it, have long histories: the cradle of early civilizations, they have been the target of numerous invasions and the scene of great tragedies. For decades, conflicts have arisen between Azerbaijan and Armenia over the Nagorno-Karabakh region.

In 1923, Joseph Stalin wanted to secure the support of Turkish-speaking Muslims in the region and ceded the Nagorno-Karabakh region to Azerbaijan. With this absurd and brutal redrawing of the country's borders, he created a mountain enclave in Azerbaijan inhabited mainly by Armenians. After the collapse of the Soviet Union, when the former republics declared their independence, the Nagorno-Karabakh region became a geopolitical powder keg.

Azerbaijan has long demanded control of the region, while the Armenians regard Nagorno-Karabakh as part of their historical homeland. Violence escalated in 1988. In 1990, Russia sent troops to the Azerbaijani capital Baku, and the conflict led to the First Nagorno-Karabakh War (1991-1994) between Armenia and Azerbaijan. Russia formed a military alliance with Armenia and was seen as the patron of the Nagorno-Karabakh region, though Russia never severed ties with Azerbaijan's government.

But the region has continued to be volatile. In 2020, during the Second Nagorno-Karabakh War, Russia was able to mediate between Armenia and Azerbaijan and a temporary ceasefire was agreed upon.

But at the end of 2022, the only access to Nagorno-Karabakh via a mountain road was blocked by Azerbaijan, preventing aid and medicine from reaching the region. This last land connection from Armenia to Nagorno-Karabakh was actually supposed to be secured by Russia. But Russia, which had begun its full-scale invasion of Ukraine on 24 February 2022, did nothing.

Azerbaijan, supported by Turkey and rich in oil, blocked the corridor and attacked Nagorno-Karabakh again in September 2023. More than 100,000 Armenians were finally expelled from Nagorno-Karabakh in the fall of 2023. Azerbaijan won the war for the region, with the help of Turkey and Israel - and not least due to Russia's passivity.

On 1 January 2024, the Nagorno-Karabakh Republic was dissolved, despite the fact that it had never been internationally recognized - not even by Armenia.

The conflict extends far beyond Armenia and neighboring Azerbaijan. The causes are ethnic, religious, geopolitical and energy-strategic.

### 00:02 DocFilm Italy Against Rainbow Families

Italy's right-wing government is legislating against rainbow families. Children with two mothers or two fathers don't align with Prime Minister Giorgia Meloni's conservative family ideal. Same-sex couples now see themselves threatened by discrimination at the hands of the state. Daniela and Valentina are a lesbian couple from Padua. They've been in a registered civil partnership since 2019. Their daughter Caterina was born in August 2022. She was conceived through a sperm donation in Denmark. Their family's happiness seemed perfect - until the new government under Giorgia Meloni came to power.

This is because rainbow families challenge the right-wing government's understanding of a 'natural' family. It says that in the case of same-sex couples, only the biological parent can be registered on the birth certificate. As a result, the public prosecutor's office in Padua has challenged the birth certificates of several children in court - including Caterina's. If the judges declare the birth certificate invalid, the non-biological mother will lose all her rights.

If Daniela's name is removed from the birth certificate, this will have far-reaching consequences. She'll only be able to collect her child from school with a power of attorney. Travelling abroad alone with her child will be practically impossible. And she'll no longer be able to make any decisions at a doctor's appointment: "That's state power. They tell me with a few lines and cold words that I don't exist, that I have to step aside," says Daniela.

Italy's right-wing government is defending the traditional Catholic family at the expense of minorities. Anything that doesn't conform to this norm is discriminated against and criminalized. In this country, it's illegal for same-sex couples to adopt, traveling abroad for surrogacy is banned and same-sex marriage is still illegal.
